Unit purpose

This unit helps learners to develop the skills they need to produce complete scripts and storyboards for non-factual television programmes, working to a brief.

Entry is at your centre's discretion. Learners should have completed a relevant group award at SCQF level 6 or above, or have an equivalent qualification or work experience, before starting the unit.

On completion of the unit, learners may progress to further study or trainee positions in the television industry.

Unit outcomes

Learners who complete this unit can:

- 1 create synopses and treatments to meet the requirements of a specified non-factual programme brief
- 2 create complete production scripts and storyboards for non-factual television programmes

Evidence requirements

Learners must demonstrate their knowledge and skills by:

- creating synopses and treatments presented in an appropriate format to meet the requirements of a specified brief
- creating a production script or storyboard to meet the requirements of a specified brief

Although not mandatory, it is a useful experience for learners to take at least one production folio through to product completion.

You assess learners on the script folios they produce in response to a brief. Their folios should contain:

- a synopsis
- a treatment
- a complete production script or storyboard

Content and context for this unit

The unit gives learners the opportunity to write a range of non-factual scripts for given programme briefs. They should write the scripts or storyboards to the stage of a production script. They should create a shooting script in the context of production management and director roles.

You might consider (but are not limited to) programme types such as:

- animation
- children's entertainment
- continuous serial
- drama
- light entertainment
- magazine programme
- music programme
- music video
- television advertising

Learners produce scripts to briefs that you supply. You may wish to work to your centre's strengths — for example, if your centre has strong links to music, you could create briefs for music videos. However, you must also introduce learners to scripts that follow standard script conventions for television.

Your role is like that of a script editor. You should ensure learners work to strict deadlines for script and storyboard revisions.

Approaches to assessment

You assess learners on script folios they produce in response to a brief.

You do not assess learners on their artistic ability. Storyboards should, however, provide clear and unambiguous guidance to other production personnel.

You may progress to further study or a trainee position in the television industry.
